Who are SIRCET?

The Stewart Island/Rakiura Community and Environment Trust (SIRCET), a non-profit organisation, was founded on the 6th March 2003 to promote projects that benefit the community and its environment around the settled parts of Stewart Island/ Rakiura. Our Halfmoon Bay Habitat Restoration project (HMBHRP) aims to create an open sanctuary in our backyard. This project started as a result of locals becoming concerned about the number of sooty shearwater/tītī and little blue penguin deaths at Ackers Point. Volunteers started to carry out predator control in the area, and with the support of landowners, the project has grown to protect 210 hectares from Ackers point to Golden Bay Road.

SIRCET is able to carry out its work through the hard work of volunteers, and with sponsorship from the community, visitors and local businesses, DOC, Environment Southland, and the generous support of a wide range of funders. 5 Minute Bird Call Count Results

5 minute bird call counts, conducted by SIRCET since 2004, are one way we monitor the Halfmoon Bay Habitat Restoration Project's success. The main objective of the project is to protect and enhance the native bird life around the township of Halfmoon Bay, so a count of how many birds can be heard over time gives us a rough picture of the overall trends.

While we have seen a second dip in the year to year data, with this kind of research it is the big picture over many years that is important and it is good to see the number of birds in the project area has remained consistently higher than when we started back in 2004.

5 minute bird counts are carried out by a contractor in April each year, thanks very much to Matt Jones for all the hard work he puts into doing these counts in all weathers!



Tītī/Sooty Shearwater monitoring

Sadly, no chicks are thought to have fledged from the Ackers Point colony in 2017. Seventy six study plot burrows were investigated which contained an estimated 28 eggs, and from which two chicks hatched but none fledged. No cat sign was noted in the colony area. One rat was seen but otherwise little sign noted. Deer sign was seen throughout the colony area.

Thanks to Sandy King, who conducted the monitoring and Jennifer Ross, a volunteer gave a total of 7.5 hours to the project.
